It was for the Climate Reality Project, a non-profit. After being accepted to participate in the Project, his dedication began.

Master Gardener program at UF, Rick has been a witness to the difference ordinary people can make. Last winter, the founder of Seeds of Inclusion approached Rick with a challenge: build a greenhouse out of recycled plastic bottles. After many hours toiled with love and effort, Seeds of Inclusion, with help from UF's Extension Master Gardeners, gifted a local summer camp for adults with severe learning disabilities, the working greenhouse in June.

HORTICULTURE

Crazy temps – wow! I am not ready to put the houseplants outside yet, but I do have a few cactus plants out there.

Now is a good time to check houseplants for mealybugs and scale as I found a few on my y houseplants. I use alcohol and Q-tips or cotton balls to rid the plants of the bugs and scale, depending on how many there are. Also, Neem Oil is good to use for the bug infestations. Look over your plants and decide if you want to donate any of them to our plant sale. Sometimes the plant has grown too big for the space it is in or you need to divide the plants because you have too many. The dollars go to help aid kids go to camp and provide scholarships to University of Florida students.



When plants start to be active, it's time to fertilize them. I use Osmocote as I sprinkle the pearls and it lasts three months. Write the date on your calendar so you know when to do it again. If you have citrus, some of the branches may be out of bounds. Now is the time to trim them. I don't let citrus get bigger than myself so I give them a haircut this time of year, especially those branches sticking out the sides. Do not mulch anywhere near the trunks as insects would be attracted to the trunk. Leave one foot on all side of citrus trunks. For bare spots I bought annual seeds at the dollar store.

Plants are going to be 3 times as much this year and seeds will work fine for me. Cold crops are almost

done. I have a few plants of lettuce left, but they are starting to flower and that means they are done for this year. I have a few peppers and cherry tomatoes that are producing, but they are tired and telling me its time to put new plants in the pot. I garden on my deck in pots, and buy already started plants.

I'm still trimming around the house and my flowering bushes that were hit by killing frost need a haircut. What is blooming? Bougainvillea, roses, coreopsis, kalanchoe and matchstick bromeliads. The oak tree has pushed off its old leaves and that new spring green is emerging. There is yellow pollen on the porch and spring is here early.

Happy gardening, I love it out there.


